2023-24



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For CRDS Rainbow Home, this reporting period represents one of their most fruitful and prosperous years. There were 80 children residing in the Home throughout the reporting period. The Home conducted a number of initiatives that were intended to boost the capacity and self-esteem of youngsters residing in the Home.

Hereunder CRDS is presenting a cumulative note about various activities carried out by the organization in the CCI during the period April 1, 2023, and March 31, 2024.

GENERAL STATUS OF THE CHILDREN

This **Child Care Institution** is housing 80 students in total throughout the reporting period. The reporting period can be characterised as a happy time, with a number of events planned, a children's outing, and staff training aimed at strengthening their capacities. The Children enrolled in various classes are listed below in tabular form

The table presents that there are eleven children have Newly Joined into this CCI during this year. Two (2) students have moved out to be part of a future program; Six children have moved to a CBC program; ten children have left the house altogether; eleven children are enrolled in a bridge course; and other children regularly attend schools and colleges. The children sincerely tried to ensure that they studied as much as they could for the exams, working with the teachers and home managers to support them. The children were separated into age

groups one elder children has been appointed as mentor to that group to solve the

quarries and raised in school and to assist in the completion of the homework; two are enrolled in vocational education, nine pupils are taking computer classes.

OTHER ACTIVITIES (Interventions & Events)

A brief description of different activities taken care by the Home. This include initiatives towards nurturing to the Health, Hygiene, Academic Development. A brief note about these activities is presented hereunder.

NUTRITION AND CARE:

provided kids with The are nutritious, well-balanced diet to guarantee that their health never deteriorates. Every now and then, the Home modifies the Menu, Two months once, and the kids are also involved in the menu preparation process. The Food Committee was established at the home to support the home mothers in maintaining a clean kitchen and to encourage children to follow basic hygiene habits, such as washing their hands both before and after meals and sanitizing cups and plates in hot water. Non-vegetarian food is served once a week, whereas eggs are provided twice a week and Chicken, we have included Mutton and Fish also in our menu as protein suppliants.

We include seasonal fruits in our menu supper at least three times a week. In addition, the children's daily meal at the home is supplemented







with greens and leafy vegetables as part of the Home's efforts to provide a balanced diet. Children who are sick and ailing need special attention. Additional food items like as bread, idly, Pongal, upma and seasonal fruits, etc. are provided by the home for them. Periodically, home mothers receive training on how to cook scrumptious and healthful meals for their kids while also paying close.

HEALTH:

Crescent Rainbow Home kept a close eye on the health of the kids in our home. When a new child comes, we measure their height and weight and perform various tests (HIV, TB, HBSHG, general checkup, etc.). Three months later, we measure the kids'

height and weight again to keep an eye on their growth. If a child has any deficiencies, we give them special foods like leafy vegetables, fruits, and eggs, or chikkies for extra nutritional supplements. Continued care and follow-up on Health and Hygiene related issues is a part of



home's manual. We ensured all children have daily bath, and home is cleaned and mopped daily to maintain hygiene. Similarly, tidiness of the clothes, regular and timely washing of school uniforms and casual wears, bed-sheets are also paid utmost

attention. It is worth mentioning that several skin-related problems were controlled to a maximum extent through these practices.

Our kids did not experience any significant health risks throughout this time. The children's safety and health were regularly monitored by taking their body temperature and



measuring their height and weight. From time to time, we sprayed bleaching powder in the home compound to ensure that there is no spread of any infections, and the children are safe and secure more ever we conduct various health camps in our home during this year.

On May 6, 2023 in presence of Dr.Khadar Basha sir, Eye Camp took place. Our house children underwent a variety of eye examinations, and none of them had any severe problems; all of them had good vision. On July 20,2023 we have conducted health camp in our home for children's by ANM Nagamani Madam and blood group of all children's have tested, On Feb 2, 2024 Dental camp has been conducted in presence of Dr. Chandra Shekhar sir for our all home children's, all are having healthy smiles no cavities.

BRIDGE COURSE OF SCHOOLING AND EDUCATION:

This year, the Bridge course began in April 2023. Of the 15 children enrolled, Few

were slow learners, and a few were recently brought into our home. A schedule was created and followed strictly for these children, and Dhananjay Sir and Praveen Sir volunteered their time to teach math and English to the children. For the other subjects, home teachers were appointed, with Ms. Sawithri teaching first to fifth class, Ms. Mamatha teaching science, and Ms. Lakshmi teaching Telugu. All



teachers employed this approach to teach the respective subjects.

All children are studying in Govt schools whereas class 1-5 children are going to Bharatmatha Primary School, and students studying 6th to 10th class attending to

Sharda Municipal High School in Anantapur. The children's teaching methods for the bridge course were different. The following methods (games, songs, stories, and activities) were chosen to teach the slow learners. The children were divided into groups based on their ability to read and write words and their inability to recognize



letters and words. This allowed us to plan better strategies to help these kids understand the concept of the bridge course.

This year, five children are pursuing the tenth grade and have been given special attention by home managers and home teachers to meet the goal. Ten children are pursuing the intermediate level and hope to work as lab technicians, physicians, or nurses in the future. CRDS Rainbow Home is supporting all of these children in realizing their dreams. Every year, we give the children's school supplies and bags.

LIFE SKILLS COURSES:

Life skills are essential for children as they equip them with the necessary tools to navigate the complexities of the world. These skills encompass a broad spectrum ranging from communication and problem-solving to decision-making and

resilience. Our home staff named Roopa Sri, Shilpa, Rani & Thriveni members had given training on life skills to our children. Topics like How to open new bank Account process and Speaker in Confidence Building were explained and shown PPT. On child Marriages, Speaker & Confidence, how to set a Goal, Awareness



Programs Etc., Through this the child realized to gain Knowledge and how they should be confident in their real life. By nurturing these abilities, children not only enhance their academic performance but also develop into well-rounded individuals capable of effectively managing relationships, adapting to various situations, and pursuing their goals with confidence. Moreover, life skills empower children to cope with challenges, make responsible choices, and contribute positively to their communities, laying a strong foundation for their future success and overall well-being.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

In addition to the academic activities, several activities related to skills development and personality development are also being carried out by Crescent Rainbow Home. A brief account of such activities carried out during the period under reporting are presented hereunder.

TRAINING IN BEAUTICIAN COURSE:

A few children who have shown interest in learning the course of beautician skills underwent a comprehensive training program of a duration of 45 days. This course,

facilitated by Jana Sikshan Samasthan, Government of India, encompassed theoretical as well as practical components, ensuring a well-rounded learning experience. Throughout the duration of the course, the children were equipped with a diverse set of skills including Mehandi Designing, Hair Cutting, Face Bleach, Make-up, and Coloring, Henna to the hair, among others. They actively participated in hands-on training sessions, gaining valuable experience in applying these skills in real-world scenarios. Upon successful completion of the course, the children were awarded certificates, validating their proficiency in beautician skills as recognized by Jana Sikshan Samasthan, Government of India. This initiative not only provided the children with valuable vocational training but empowered them with the necessary skills to pursue



careers in the beauty industry, contributing to their personal and professional development.

YOGA:

CRDS, in its commitment to holistic development, appointed a proficient guru home

manager Shilpa to impart yoga training to children. With a deep understanding of yogic techniques, the guru guided the children through yoga asanas and pranayama, practices rooted in ancient wisdom for regulating vital energies within the body. These sessions not only focused on physical well-being but also emphasized moral and spiritual



growth. Through consistent practice, the children experienced the transformative

benefits of yoga, both physically and spiritually. The resource person's expertise facilitated rapid progress in mastering various asanas, enabling the children to cultivate a deeper connection with their bodies and inner selves. By providing such opportunities for yoga training, CRDS not only enriched the children's lives with valuable skills but also nurtured their spiritual development, laying a foundation for a balanced and harmonious life.

ARTS & CRAFTS:

Under the nurturing guidance of Ameena Teacher, our children have honed remarkable skills in various crafts. They have demonstrated exceptional talent in crafting artificial flowers using colorful papers, crafting thread bangles and earnings

with silk threads, and most recently, crafting a variety of stunning handbags. Through their innate creativity and the encouragement provided bν Home Management, the children have achieved remarkable proficiency in these crafts. Their dedication and perseverance have the creation resulted in of



aesthetically pleasing and high-quality handmade products. This not only showcases their artistic abilities but also highlights the positive impact of providing a supportive environment that fosters creativity and skill development. The accomplishments of our children in crafting reflect not only their talent but also the effectiveness of the nurturing and encouragement provided by Home Management, empowering them to explore their creative potential and excel in various craft forms.

SPOKEN ENGLISH:

English is undeniably one of the most influential and sought-after languages globally, offering individuals access to a multitude of opportunities. Proficiency in reading, writing, and speaking English not only broadens horizons but also enhances the quality of life. Recognizing the significance of English language skills, CRDS embarked on a mission to empower children through a Spoken English course. Over a span of 45 days, children underwent comprehensive training under the guidance of expert trainer Praveen Sir. The course delved into various aspects of English language,

including parts of speech, verb usage, tenses, articles, and prepositions. Moreover,

practical exercises such as selfintroductions and engaging in conversations were incorporated to reinforce learning.

Through CRDS's initiative and Praveen Sir's expertise, children were equipped with the necessary linguistic tools to confidently communicate in English, thus opening doors to a



myriad of opportunities and significantly enhancing their prospects for personal and professional growth.

SPORTS & GAMES:

The house continues to promote fine arts as well as sports and received games. Youngsters instruction in martial arts, dancing, and singing. It is created as a of the component Home curriculum. Every evening, they received physical activity in the form of sports and games, which served to both strengthen their physical fitness and foster a spirit of competition.



OUTING AND EXPOSER VISIT:

On the 13th May 2023, the children residing in CRDS Rainbow Home were treated to a memorable outing to the nearby National Park. Excitement buzzed in the air as they embarked on this adventure, eager to explore and create lasting memories. Upon arrival, the group assembled at a designated spot within the park. CHILDREN PARTICIPATION AND LEADERSHIP:

We organized the kids into committees within the house. These are the committees

responsible for welcoming guests, distribution, purchasing, clean and green food, and discipline. We teach the kids how committees are formed and run, and we rotate them once every three months. Six kid-focused clubs were established during the reporting period: the



Garden & Drawing Club, the Sports Club, the Literacy Club, the Laughing Club, and the Cultural Club. Every two weeks, these groups have review sessions to discuss their performance and activities. Children in Literacy Club possess both creative writing skills and a liking for literature. Additionally, they gather more data from the daily newspaper and disseminate it to all kids. The focus of Sports Club is on those who enjoy sports and want to see others get involved in them. The children who are a part of the Cultural Club are getting better at many art forms. The club arranges skill-practicing activities and invites other children who are interested to participate in cultural events such as dances, songs, and mimicries. The gardening club tends to the vegetables and flowers. By telling jokes and making everyone laugh, Laughing Club leads laughing lessons. Kids are thrilled about these clubs, and they can't wait until Sunday to join in on the club activities.

CELEBRATIONS AND FESTIVALS

No matter what community celebrates or owns the day, the kids at the Home are always in a celebratory spirit on festival days. Every festival and occasion is observed in the Home with equal fervor and participation. During the reporting period, the Home observed and celebrated the following holidays and occasions. Kids are thrilled about these clubs, and they can't wait until Sunday to join in on the club activities.

Mahatma Jyoti Rao Phule Birthday Celebrations: On 11/04/2023 being the occasion

of the birth anniversary of Mahatma Jyoti Rao Phule, tributes were paid to his picture by placing flowers. Also, the children narrated the biography of Jyoti Rao Phule. Jyoti Rao Govind Rao Phule was an Indian social activist, businessman, anti-caste social reformer and writer from Maharashtra. His work extended to many fields, including eradication of untouchability and



the caste system and for his efforts in educating women and oppressed caste people.

Ramzan Festival: Today 22/04/2023 Ramzan Festival, is always an occasion of joy for the children as they got up early in the morning took their bath. The month of

Ramadan is that in which was revealed the Quran; a guidance for mankind, and clear proofs of the guidance, and the criterion (of right and wrong). The importance of keeping fasting, and how it helps in building a good health among the human beings is explained to



the children, comparing the tradition of fasting being followed by people of various religions in their own styles.

Rainbow Home Annual day Celebrations: On 28/05/2023 the Annual Day Celebration of the Home was celebrated at CRDS Rainbow Home. They were the chief

guests of the program Humanitarian Convener Tarimela Amarnath Reddy, Shashikala, CRDS Project Director, H. Shilpa - Home Manager 2, M. Reddy Rani - Teacher cum Health Worker. First, all the children also started the program with the song "Pillalam Memu Pillalam". Later the children explained about the



home very well. Saddam Basha said CRDS Rainbow Home was inaugurated on 28/05/2010. Children who have no mother and father, children who have no mother, children who roam the streets, children who roam around bus stands and railway stations, economically disadvantaged children are all here and explained that their lost rights will be returned here. It was also explained that since then till now many children have gone out and settled in good jobs. Similarly, Amaranatha Reddy and Shashikala are like two eyes to CRDS Rainbow Home and we are in this position only because of their support. Saddam sir said that many of the children in the home have got good education and are now settled in good jobs.

Christmas Festival: On December 25, 2023 the kids at home have celebrated Christmas. They got up early, had a bath, and dressed in fresh and new-looking dresses. Then, they all gathered in one room, where some of the females gave speeches explaining why they celebrate the holiday. We then ate the prepared food and watched TV after that.

New Year Celebrations: On the eve of New Year, the children got up early in the morning and then all the team members cut the cake along with the children and expressed their wishes for the new year, and also performed pooja, hoping that everything would go well without any trouble in the new year.

Bhogi & Sankranthi Festival: On 14th and 15th of January 2023, day of Bhogi and Sankranthi were celebrated in the Home. The children get up early in the morning

and light bonfires and make noise around them with songs. Later head bathed and performed pooja. Everyone gathered in a room and the children gave a speech that the special feature of Bhogi festival is that on the morning of the festival we collect all the old things in our house and put them on fire and gather around them. He also said that in



some areas Bhogi fruits are also given to small children.

On the day of Sankranti, the main festival, children got up early in the morning and

He inquired about the facilities available to the children and held a meeting with them to discuss how important it is for them to develop various skills in order to survive in society today. He also gave them a brief overview of the skill trainings that the NSDC is offering and encouraged them to actively participate in all of the trainings in order to acquire useful skills for a better future.

Mr. Anand Reddy (Assistant Collector Anantapur) Visit: On July 07, 2023, Mr. Anand Reddy, the Assistant Collector of Anantapur, paid us a visit at our CRDS Rainbow home. During the visit, he spoke with Saddam Basha, the CRDS Project Director, and all the program staff. He also verified all the home's records, looked over the entire infrastructure, and engaged with the children and staff of the CRDS Rainbow home. asked them about the amenities in the house, the food's nutritional worth, the cleanliness of the house, and some suggestions to follow for improved outcomes. Later, I asked about the kids' schooling and attendance.

Mr. Venkat Swamy (MEO Anantapur) Visit: On August 14, 2023, Mr. Venkat Swamy, MEO (Mandal Education Officer), paid a visit to our CRDS Rainbow Home. During his visit, Mr. Swamy engaged in meaningful interactions with the children, showing genuine interest in their academic progress and well-being. He inquired about their completion of the academic year syllabus in schools, demonstrating his concern for their educational development. Additionally, Mr. Swamy took the opportunity to inquire about the facilities provided both in the home and in schools, emphasizing the importance of a conducive learning environment for the children's overall growth. Furthermore, Mr. Swamy showed a keen interest in the nutritional aspect of the children's education by inquiring about the quality of mid-day meals provided in schools. He sought to ensure that the meals were nutritious, recognizing the crucial role of proper nutrition in supporting the children's health and learning outcomes. Additionally, Mr. Swamy inquired about the effectiveness of the teaching staff, showing a commitment to ensuring that the children receive quality education and support from their teachers.

Mrs. V.L Kameshwari CWC officer Visit: On November 27, 2023, a significant visit occurred at CRDS Rainbow Home, as Mrs. V.L. Kameshwari from the CWC (Child

Welfare Committee) Department conducted a thorough inspection of the premises. Madam Kameshwari meticulously scrutinized every aspect of the home, starting with the quality of food provided to the children. Recognizing the critical role of nutrition in child development, she ensured that the meals met



the required standards for health and nourishment. Furthermore, Madam Kameshwari assessed the accommodation quality, meticulously examining the living conditions to guarantee that they were conducive to the well-being and comfort of the children. She also evaluated the facilities available at the home, aiming to ascertain that they adequately catered to the needs of the children, both in terms of education and recreation.

In addition to the physical aspects of the home, Madam Kameshwari took a keen interest in the interpersonal dynamics, particularly the behaviour of the home

managers and home mothers towards the children. She interacted directly with the children to gain insights into their experiences and perceptions, ensuring that their voices were heard and their concerns addressed. Moreover, Madam Kameshwari prioritized health and growth of the children by



conducting assessments of their height and weight. This comprehensive approach reflects her dedication to ensuring the holistic well-being of the children under the care of CRDS Rainbow Home. Madam Kameshwari's visit underscores the commitment of the CWC Department to uphold the rights and welfare of children. By conducting thorough inspections and engaging with both the children and the staff, she reinforces the importance of accountability and transparency in child care

institutions. Her efforts contribute to the ongoing efforts to provide a safe, nurturing, and supportive environment for the children, ensuring that they have the opportunity to thrive and reach their full potential.

Mrs. D. Vasanthi (Deputy Mayor) Visit: On February 3, 2024, CRDS Rainbow Homes

received a distinguished visitor in the form of D. Vasanthi Madam, the Deputy Mayor of Anantapur. Madam Vasanthi's visit marked a significant occasion as she undertook a comprehensive examination of the premises. Her primary focus was on the wellbeing of the children residing in the home. With genuine concern,



she meticulously enquired about the number of children under the care of Rainbow Homes and delved into their health status. Understanding the importance of access to government schemes for the holistic development of children, Madam Vasanthi ensured that all eligible students were availing themselves of these benefits. During her visit, Madam Vasanthi exemplified her commitment to the welfare of the community, particularly its vulnerable members. By actively engaging with the staff and children, she sought to understand the challenges and opportunities present within the home. Her inquiries about the health status of the children underscored her dedication to ensuring their physical well-being. Furthermore, her emphasis on the utilization of government schemes highlighted her advocacy for equal access to resources and opportunities for all children.

Kia India Women's employees' visit: On March 7, 2024, KIA India Women employees, under the direction of Ms. Tejaswi, PR, KIA India, and Ms. Yasmeen, along with other female employees who have a "heart" for people in need, visited the home and celebrated International Women's Day at CRDS Rainbow Home in Lakshmi Nagar, Anantapur. This was another instance of a warm occasion. The group also delighted in painting while seated alongside the kids and preparing a meal that exuded a strong sense of "motherly" tenderness and devotion.

They shared lunch together as a group with the kids, a memory these kids will never

forget. They have given the girl children a number of necessities, such as electronic devices, school bags, sanitary napkins, cosmetics, etc.; these are gifts that the children will always remember. It is CRDS's good fortune that a number of obedient and modest individuals regularly stop by the Home to spend time with the kids, interacting with them in a way that



gives them the impression that they are not alone in the world and that there are many people in it.

Monitoring Visits by Rainbow Home India City Desk Team: Over the course of the monitoring visits conducted by the Rainbow Home India City Desk team,

spanning from July 26 to July 27, 2023, December 14 to December 15, 2023, and March 1 to March 2, 2024, a thorough evaluation of the organization's operations undertaken. The team, comprised of Ahoran, S.A. Samad, Kranthi and V. Shivashankar. Kumar. meticulously reviewed all organizational records and conducted physical verifications of accommodations. Additionally, they rigorously assessed the nutrition values of the food provided, recognizing its pivotal role in the children's well-being. Moreover, the team facilitated review meetings with staff, delving into various aspects of the projects. They enquired about diligently the





number of children enrolled in the program, ensu ring alignment with child protection policies.

The engagement extended to the examination of CPP (Child Protection Policy) groups

and the level of parental involvement the in project activities. Subsequently, field visits were conducted to gain firsthand insights into the implementation of the projects. Following these assessments, the team meticulously cross-verified all accounting books to ensure financial transparency and



accountability. Their commitment to thoroughness extended to providing valuable

suggestions aimed at enhancing the efficiency of project from operations multiple perspectives. These suggestions encompassed various facets of project management, ultimately to the contributing overall enhancement of Rainbow Home's endeavors in providing a safe and nurturing environment



for the children under its care. Through their diligent efforts and insightful recommendations, the City Desk team reaffirmed their dedication to supporting Rainbow Home in its mission to empower and uplift.

CHALLENGES FACED

♦ CRDS Rainbow Home is facing significant challenges due to a lack of support from government entities. Despite its vital role in providing essential services and support to vulnerable Children, the organization struggles to secure necessary funding, infrastructure assistance, and policy backing from local government authorities. This lack of support hampers the organization's ability to expand its reach, maintain existing programs, and effectively address the needs of the communities it serves. Without adequate government backing, CRDS Rainbow

Home finds itself increasingly reliant on alternative sources of funding and facing obstacles in fulfilling its mission to empower and uplift marginalized individuals and families.

- CRDS Rainbow Home is encountering challenges from the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) Department regarding the admission of new children into its care. Despite the organization's efforts to provide a safe and nurturing environment for vulnerable children, the CWC Department has been reluctant to issue necessary orders for placement, often neglecting or delaying responses to the home's requests. Furthermore, there have been objections raised by the CWC Department regarding children already residing in CRDS Rainbow Home, with demands to reunite them with their biological parents, regardless of the circumstances that led to their placement in the home. Addressing these challenges requires a multi-faceted approach that prioritizes the best interests of the children under CRDS Rainbow Home's care while also collaborating constructively with the CWC Department. Firstly, it's crucial to engage in open and transparent communication with the CWC Department, emphasizing the importance of timely and supportive responses to placement requests. This may involve regular meetings, updates on the children's well-being, and providing evidence of the positive impact CRDS Rainbow Home has on their lives.
- ♦ CRDS Rainbow Home faces a significant challenge from parents who express a desire to reclaim their children from the home's care, only to engage them in activities such as begging, rat picking, or child labor. Despite the efforts of the home's staff to persuade these parents to reconsider and allow their children to remain in the safe and nurturing environment provided by CRDS Rainbow Home for a better future, the parents persist in causing continuous disruptions. This ongoing nuisance created by these parents poses one of the most significant challenges for the CRDS Rainbow Home project. It requires a delicate balance of advocacy, outreach, and intervention to ensure the well-being and safety of the children entrusted to the home's care. The staff must continue their dedicated efforts to engage with these parents, emphasizing the importance of education, protection, and opportunities for their children's future, while also navigating the complexities of familial dynamics and socio-economic pressures. By remaining steadfast in their commitment to the children's best interests and persisting in their efforts to mitigate the risks posed by these parental challenges, CRDS

Rainbow Home can continue to provide a beacon of hope and support for vulnerable children in need.

• CRDS Rainbow Home faces a distinct challenge stemming from its location in a small town with limited resources and a small catchment area. Unlike other Rainbow Homes, fundraising efforts for infrastructure development and providing nutritious food for children prove more challenging due to the town's size and restricted range. The lack of civil society mobilization exacerbates this issue, making it difficult to garner the necessary funds to meet the needs of the children under the home's care. Recognizing this hurdle, CRDS Rainbow Home advocates for increased allocation of funds in the budget to address these pressing concerns. By highlighting the unique challenges posed by the home's location and emphasizing the critical importance of adequate resources for the well-being of the children, CRDS Rainbow Home aims to secure the support needed to fulfil its mission effectively.

The **Family Base Care** program (FBC) of CRDS Rainbow Home initiative is a ray of hope for those who are in vulnerable conditions and in need of care and support. Even in the ever-changing field of child welfare, we are steadfast in our dedication offering all-encompassing care and assistance. The Family Base Care (FBC) Program has provided children in need with a safe haven where they can develop and thrive. This report details our joint efforts to support these kids' overall development by attending to their emotional, physical, and educational needs. Our projects have a significant impact on the community and the lives of the people we serve.

By restating our dedication to their welfare, we acknowledge the significance of creating a more sustainable and inclusive future for everybody. An average of 15 children use our services. No children were restored/reintegrated during the reporting period, and 10 children have newly joined from CCI Program. NUTRITIONAL CARE INTERVENTIONS UNDER FBC

The goal of CRDS's Rainbow Home initiative is to offer comprehensive support to the families participating in the Family Base Care (FBC) program. Understanding how critical it is to alleviate food insecurity among these disadvantaged families, we have put in place a thorough plan to provide dry rations and basic food supplies. Through our initiatives we assure that the family of each FBC kid has access to wholesome meals, fostering the child's resilience and general well-being. By means of our endeavors, CRDS has effectively furnished dry rations and vital food items to every family of FBC children, guaranteeing food security underprivileged. By meeting this basic need, we strengthen families' resilience



and general well-being and provide them the tools they need to create better futures for their kids and themselves.

The CRDS Rainbow Home project is still dedicated to using creative solutions and calculated alliances to provide food security for the families of FBC children. Our goal is to make all families in our community have a more sustainable and fair future by tackling the underlying

causes of food insecurity.

To ensure consistent support for FBC families, CRDS Rainbow Home project has established a monthly distribution system for dry ration kits. These kits are meticulously curated based on the specific needs of the program, encompassing essential food items vital for nutritional sustenance.

Each month, families receive these kits, providing them with a reliable source of nourishment to meet their dietary requirements. The manual prescribed for assembling these kits is designed with



careful consideration of the nutritional needs and preferences of the families we serve. AWARENESS PROGRAMS ON GOAL SETTING AND ACHIEVEMENT



On 5th November 2023, a Goal Setting Achievement program was conducted with resource person Rammohan Reddy and CRDS director Saddambasha leading the session. Ms. Shilpa, the Home Manager and teachers Mamata and Savitri joined alongside the children. The session commenced with meditation for all attendees followed by an insightful explanation from Rammohan Reddy regarding the importance of goal setting. He emphasized the necessity of supplementing studies with additional skills such as computer literacy, driving, and occasional training. He stressed particularly about the significance of learning English and computer skills concurrently with academic pursuits. Later, the resource person focussed on Personal, Short-Term and Long-Term goals and the importance of each such goal setting.

Personal Goal Setting: The session highlighted the significance of personal, professional, and community-oriented goals. Personal goals, such as maintaining good health through balanced nutrition, yoga, and exercise, were emphasized alongside the importance of focusing on classroom learning. In the professional realm, goals encompass career advancement and community service. Notably, individuals who leave a lasting impact on society were identified as a distinct group, with an emphasis on collaborative efforts toward

shared objectives. Furthermore, in later degrees like BA, BSc, and BCom, courses vary

widely, ranging from humanities and social sciences to natural sciences and commerce-related subjects, offering students a diverse array of academic pursuits to choose from.

Short-Term Goal Setting: The resource person explained that Short-Terms career goals are stepping stones to the long-term dreams. Everyone has to work on SMART goals (Specific, Measurable, Achievable,



Relevant, Time-bound) for skill development, networking, or project performance while aiming at their career. Aim for achievements within a year to stay motivated and track progress. These wins will build momentum and keep you on course for your bigger career vision.

Long Term Goal Setting: In the session, it was emphasized that goal setting extends beyond academic achievements, encompassing short-term goals like occasional training and long-

term aspirations such as securing a job or starting a business. Planning plays a pivotal role, requiring meticulous timetable preparation spanning two years to ensure steady progress. For instance, aspiring constables were advised to prioritize completing their education, focusing on subjects like general knowledge and maintaining a daily habit of newspaper reading. Self-awareness, recognizing



strengths and weaknesses, was underscored as crucial.

LIFE SKILLS PROGRAMS



The life skills program at Crescent Rainbow Home was a success, featuring Mr. Saddam Basha and Mr. Rammohan Reddy as key facilitators. Mr. Saddam initiated the event with warm greetings, setting a positive tone.

Mr. Rammohan Reddy elaborated on the program's objectives to the children and engaged them in a concentration test game to assess their focus. Following the game, discussions delved into essential topics such as risk assessment, emphasizing the importance of understanding success and failure to guide future decisions. Moreover, insights were shared on relevant courses for the children's personal and professional development. Staff members and future beneficiaries actively participated, ensuring the program's meaningful impact.

The encapsulates a comprehensive journey of growth and learning at Crescent Rainbow Home, where anthropology and history serve as foundational pillars. Anthropology, illuminating the essence of humanity across millions of years, underscores the unique attribute of discretion that distinguishes humans from animals. Education, particularly in pharmacy, is highlighted for its burgeoning demand and expansive opportunities, surpassing even traditional medical professions in present-day hospitals. Emphasizing the paramount importance of effective communication skills, the report underscores their pivotal role in navigating diverse social environments. Future children, nurtured within the home until their intermediate education, are equipped with essential life skills for venturing into the wider world. The report underscores the imperative of adapting to external environments, fostering resilience, and cultivating meaningful relationships as crucial elements for a seamless transition into adulthood. By instilling values of societal comportment and adept

interpersonal skills, Crescent Rainbow Home endeavors to empower its beneficiaries for a future devoid of shortcomings.

The following topics highly relevant to life skills management were discussed in depth.

Time Management: Time management encompasses the allocation of one's time across various activities throughout the day, beginning from the moment one wakes up in the morning until bedtime. It involves planning how much time to dedicate to tasks such as attending college, studying, meals, and rest. Prioritizing study time ensures academic success while maintaining a healthy balance with other essential activities like meals and sufficient sleep promotes overall well-being. Considering that a significant portion of our lifespan, roughly 20 years, is spent sleeping, the importance of quality rest cannot be overstated in achieving good health. Additionally, during exam periods, effective time management becomes even more critical. Creating a structured timetable for exams allows for the efficient allocation of time to different subjects or topics, ensuring adequate preparation for each. By adhering to a well-planned schedule, individuals can optimize their productivity, reduce stress, and ultimately enhance their academic performance.

Money Management: Another most important aspects of life skills are "money management". It is related to is how much you spend rather than how much you earn. For example, if you earn 1000000 and spend 95000, that's better than if you earn 50000 and

spend 40000. In order for your earnings to be meaningful, you need to be spending less and saving more. The amount of emergency found should be strictly limited. Anything could happen at any point in your life, you could lose your job, you could suffer a health issue, or you could find yourself in a lockdown situation, situations that you don't know when they'll happen, so keeping enough for at least two to three months will



be very helpful. Saving amount is very necessary in life. We should learn to save some amount of our monthly earnings. For example, if our income is 100 rupees, we should save 10 rupees. One should make a habit of saving and reducing expenses without spending more than necessary.

WOMEN AND CHILD RIGHTS PROGRAMS



A training session on women and child rights and life skills program was recently conducted at Crescent Rainbow Home. The program was attended by esteemed individuals including Project Director Mr. Saddam Basha, and Resource Person Mr. Ram Mohan Reddy, along with CRDS team members, and prospective children and their parents.

Mr. Rammohan Reddy, the resource person, commenced the session by elucidating on child rights, emphasizing the rights entitled to children. He proceeded to introduce the Disha app, elaborating on its functionalities. Furthermore, Mr. Reddy shed light on the significance of the helpline number 1098 and its operational procedures. He stressed the importance of reporting incidents such as ragging and inappropriate touching among school and collegegoing children to relevant authorities. Additionally, Mr. Reddy conducted a comprehensive explanation on the concept of good touch and bad touch, highlighting the importance of understanding and distinguishing between the two. The training session provided valuable insights and knowledge regarding the rights of women and children, equipping attendees with essential information and skills to safeguard themselves and their communities.

The training session at Crescent Rainbow Home also focussed on the Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS), initiated in 2009, which is aimed at safeguarding the rights of children. Attendees were briefed on the alarming issue of mortality rates among women and children. Particularly distressing was the practice of female foeticide upon determining the gender of the unborn child. Moreover, discussions delved into prevalent issues such as

domestic violence and sexual harassment, emphasizing the need for intervention and protection.

A few other issues discussed during this program included Domestic Violence and eradicating this from the society in a collective way and stern voice. Domestic violence is

some form of abuse including exerting mental, physical, and sexual pressures or abuse in a domestic setting, such as in marriage commonly known as intimate partner violence.

Also included were Mrs. Nagaveni, Anganwadi staff of Rajeev Colony, Ms. Shilpa - Home Manager CRDS, Ms. Lakshmi Kanthamma - RCCLC In-charge, and Ms. Mamatha - Community Mobilizer and Teacher.

The resource persons explained that Women empowerment is the main slogan of Development Sector, as an empowered woman / mother can raise a powerful baby/child that gives a bright future to any nation. There are many formulation strategies and initiation processes initiated by the Government of India for women's empowerment in India which the

women have make use of to gain success in their life, and also to lead their families in the path of progress.

Similarly, in Rajiv Colony Learning Center, RCCLC provides vocational trainings programs like training in Tailoring, and Beautician courses – exclusively for women with the intention that they should develop economically. This will, in turn, leads towards their moral empowerment which will lead to bringing a big change in the entire family and family atmosphere – their thinking, their decision making, their behaviour, and their ability to face the challenges, and go ahead.

The Resource persons who attended these programs have appreciated the efforts of CRDS organization in this regard and felt that it is doing good programs for the overall development of women and children in this area. They advised the women to understand what everyone has talked about during these meetings and get inspired to bring a change int heir lives.

DOCUMENT VERIFICATION OF RCCLC CHILDREN



In the past year, our learning center undertook a comprehensive initiative to verify and rectify discrepancies in the Aadhaar cards and date of birth certificates of children enrolled in our programs. Through diligent home visits to the residences of our students, we ensured that their documentation was accurate and aligned with our records. Any errors discovered were promptly corrected, with families encouraged to reach out to us for assistance in rectifying mistakes. Furthermore, we emphasized the importance of consistency between official documents and educational records, highlighting the advantages of having accurate documentation for accessing various government services and educational opportunities. Our outreach efforts extended to all colonies within the Panchayat, prioritizing households with vacancies in our programs to facilitate enrollment for new learners. During these visits, we also engaged with parents and children, providing information on the benefits of accurate

documentation and guiding them on the process of correcting any errors. Additionally, we utilized these interactions to inform families about the activities and resources available at our learning center, ensuring that all students, including newcomers, felt supported and empowered in their educational journey.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

In addition to the above main activities several other activities were also initiated and their benefits were extended to the target families.

Nutrition and Health Care:

- Menu: The menu changes every three months by taking the ideas of the children.
 Children's favourites items were considered in the menu along with nutritional aspects.
- Malnourished: During this period the team prepared food intake chart which helps them to boost Fiber, minerals, and vitamins which strengthen the child physically and emotionally.

Children Participation and Leadership:

Children were encouraged to get involved in different Children's Committees.

Food Committee & Achievements: Children led Food committees were formed. Members of the food committee team are actively engaged and caring for very special and needy children in eating and avoiding specific fruits, vegetables, and green vegetables for which some of them are allergic. The food committee has succeeded in getting children to eat bitter guard and other vegetables without throwing them away.

Bala Sabha: Every day children gather at a particular place, and they share the day's good and bad moments. They express how the day makes them help to grow and develop themselves. Children feel happy during the Bala Sabha hour.

Sister's Group: Sisters' groups comprise of the elder children which are divided to look after the younger children. These elder children help the younger to maintain personal hygiene, look after their necessaries in education and health, and if they face any difficulty in communicating with others.

Festivals and Celebrations

Festivals of all religions and communities were celebrated in the Centre. All the children are involved in the celebration of all National Festivals too.

Dr. BR. Ambedkar's Death Anniversary: Organized a meeting on the even of Ambedkar Vardhanthi, for which the chief guest was Mr. Neelakantha, CBC Coordinator, along with Ms. Hoor Banu, Govt. MPP School Teacher, Rajiv Colony. The staff of CRDS, Ms. Lakshmi Kanthamma, RCCLC In-charge, Ms. Mamatha, Mobilizer and Teacher, Ms. Nagaveni,

Anganwadi Teacher were also present along with Children of the centre, and their mothers participated.

The children and their mothers who attended the meeting were told about Ambedkar and how the constitution written by him is still in force. CRDS staff and Govt. MPP School Teacher have explained about preparation of Indian Constitution by Shri Ambedkar, which is being implemented in our country developed.




Jyothi Rao Phule Death Anniversary: Rajeev Colony RCCLC (Mahatma Gandhi Rainbow

Most of the people in the society, particularly the student have Math's Fear, and feel it difficult to understand and learn mathematics. However, Maths is very necessary to in life is also easy if learnt properly. He explained that Shri Sreenivasa Ramanujan made Maths easy to



understand through teaching techniques in doing calculations or new formulas and got fame as a great man and even children understand maths without being afraid of it. He wants the children to study well and have a good future and he expressed his gratitude to the children for making the program successful by attending the program.

Awareness Program on Good Touch Bad Touch: Rajeev Colony RCCLC has organized a meeting for the Children to understand the difference between "Good Touch & Bad Touch" Mr. Neelakantha, CBC Coordinator was the chief guest for this program. Other participants included Mr. Kiran Kumar - Accountant, CRDS, Kiran Kumar, Ms. Lalitha Kumari – Police Gramasachivalayam-1, Ms. Likitha - Police from Sachivalayamu-2, Ms. Lakshmikanthamma, RCCLC In-charge, Ms. Mamatha, Mobilizer and Teacher, along with children and their mothers. During this program the participants, particularly the children of all age groups were explained about how to differentiate a Good Touch Vs Bad Touch. The key points included:

- It is the parents who have to tell the children something good. something bad. What kind of touch? who should not be allowed to come close? where no one should touch. Let go of this trend soon. What is good and bad should be explained to the children.
- We are always seeing cases of kidnapping, molestation, and sexual abuse of children.
 However, some parents find it difficult to teach some sensitive things to their children.
 Experts say that if children are not aware of these things, such atrocities will continue to happen. So, they wanted to protect their children. They say that some things should be discussed with children. They say that they should be made aware of good touch and bad touch before it is too late.
- Some tips are also suggested for all of them to protect themselves from the hand of people having bad intentions.
